Dear Mr. Barson:

In response to your request in our telephone conversation of April 24, I have examined data on the expenditures of young couples with annual incomes after taxes of \$2,000 to \$3,000, as reported in our Survey of Consumer Expenditures in 1960 in Dallas. This is the income class in which a person with income of \$3,600 for a 16-month period would have been classified. Although the samples for subclasses of Reilies in this income group, i.e., young fearilies, renting families, its small, the average annual expenditures for 100 feet of 5-month particular. This would amount to about 9550 to 30 feet of 5-month carton.

The 1960 expenditure survey in Dallas and the Bureau's standard budget studies in Houston indicate that a couple would spend

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approximately \$100 to \$150 during a 16-month period for personal care goods and services, e.g., baircuts, cosmetics, etc. Transportation expenditures for families who did not own automobiles amounted to about \$200 at that time.
