On October 31, 1963, J. H. KITCHING, Dallas County Sheriff's Office, and LEON POWERS, Irving, Texas, Police Department, advised that they had no record for RUTH PAINE.

On October 31, 1963, Mr. TED SCHURMAN, Security Officer, Bell Helicopter, Fort Worth, Texas, advised that MICHAEL R. PAINE was presently employed by that company as an engineer and he holds a security clearance.

On November 1, 1963, Mrs. RUTH PAINE, 2515 West Fifth Street, Irving, Texas, was interviewed at which time she advised that MARINA OSWALD, wife of LEE HARVET OSWALD, was staying with her following the recent birth of her baby. Mrs. PAINE furnished OSWALD's place of employment as the Texas School Book Depository, 411 Eim Street, Dallas, Texas, where he was employed as a laborer. Mrs. PAINE stated that she did not know where OSWALD was residing in Dallas at this time but that it was his plan as soon as he had enough money, to get an apartment for his family and take his wife and children to live with him. Mrs. PAINE voluncered that she would be glad to furnish this address to the FBI as soon as she determined where the OSWALDs were residing.

On November 5, 1963, Mrs. RUTH PAINE advised SAs JAMES P. HOSTY, JR. and GARF S. WILSON that she had not been able to obtain the address of LEE GSWALD in Dallas, Texas, but that she would furnish it to the FBI as soon as she was able to obtain it. Mrs. PAINE advised that LEE GSWALD had visited his wife, MARINA OSWALD on November 2 and 3, 1963, at Irving, Texas.

Mrs. PAINE then expressed the opinion that she considered LEE OSWALD to be a very illogical person and recalled that he admitted to her being a "Trotskyite Communist."

# Results of interview with George Senator, Ruby's roomnate.

## DETAILS OF INVESTIGATION

### Reference is made to previous reports.

Goorge (Eff) Senator (thits; male; 5-7½; 192; brown eyes; brokn-jrwy hair; dark complexion, mola laft check; appendetary scar, sut scar thy of ring finger of laft hand) was interviewed at the Ballas Office December 3, 1963, for the purpose of ascortining his breignound and association with Jack New, who shot and killed too Houvey Owenli.

George Senator stated that he use born of Jutkin parents at Gloversville, New York on September 4, 1933. He has one brother Hiving in Gloversville, another brother at Bochestor, and three aniroid sisters Hiving in Her York City. He correlated his formal education upon graduation from gravins school at Gloversville in June 1939. He wont to How York City and worked in a hat factory, for Sectorn Union, in the wholesale silk industry, and has unemployed at times. About 1932 he developed hung trouble and roturned to Goversville for about one year, part of which he worked for a brother the operated a small restaurant. He returned to Her York City and apin worked in the silk industry. About 1934, he again returned to Gloversville and loft there with maighbors, the Selving family, to go to Florida. He worked at Minni in virious resorts as a kitchen worker. Estween 1934, and 1934 he lived and worked in both Key Tork City and Hari.

On August 21, 1941, he entered the Army Mir Force and was assigned critial number 12,005,012. He served mainly no an aerial amourer with the 5th Leaber Cornand, 31rd Group in Australia and Pacific Theater during brild War II.

### He was discharged as a Staff Sergeant on September 9, 1945.

He then operated a lunch counter in New York City for about one year. In January 1946, he married Shirley Daron of the Bronx. A son, Robert, was bern of this marriage on October 6, 1947. He was divored in 1956 in Dallas and his former wife later married a man numed Wooler.

Senator wont to Miani in 1947 and worked as a lunch counterman for about two yet, s. He then became a dress saleman for the heha Manufacturing Company of Hilmakes for about mine months. The next ton years he sold dresses for sholar Bros. of Chicago and moved to Dallas for that company about May 1954. He travaled considerably as a Clothing saleman out of Dallas until about 1959 - 1960. He then worked at odd jobs and in solling various lines, including novelities for the Voluma Sales (or of Dallas until about the Carvado Club from March to August 1962, and at various other short pariods since. He is proceently a saleman of colored post cards for Dexter Press, West

About one and one-half years ago, Senator moved into an apartment with Jack huby, however, he stayed only about five months. He explained that huby "imit very neat about the house." Senator than moved into the Granibury Apartments on Maple Avenue with Stanton Corbat, a dress buyer. In November, Corbat and Senator moved to Apartment 206, 223 S. bidng Stroet, most to huby who by then occupied Apartment 207. Corbat narried on August 10, 1963, and on November 1, 1963, Senator moved into Apartment 207 with huby. The spartment had a living-dining room, kitchen, bath and two bedrooms and rented for \$125,00 a month.

Senator stated that huby is a big-hearted man who has helped many people who were down on their luck. He said that Ruby was vory emotional and, although he did not appear to be very religious, took his faith very seriously, observing all the Orthodox Jondsh Holidays and particularly the memorial services for the doad. Ruby, he said, was a clean living man; did not suche; rarely drank; liked to exercise by bar bells with occasional golf and swiming; and was concerned about the fact that Senator drank too much in his opinion. Senator said he had heard runors since "the trouble" that huby is a housemual and folt that such ideas cast a reflection him as he had lived with buby. He said he could assure anyone that Ruby is not a homosecual and has a normal man's interest in woman. Ruby has no firm political convictions but regarded hinself as a Democrat. Senator said huby was a man who liked people and had a strong desire to be liked. He sometimes talked rough but actually was a contle porson. Senator discounted reports that huby is a "stroot brauler" but said that he can "handle hinself" if nocessary as he often had to act as bouncer at his club. Sonator stated that he did not know Oswald and that he was cortain that Buby did not.

Senator was questioned regarding his movements from November 22 to the 21th. He stated that he laft the apartaont at 223 S. Exing Stroot at approximately 8130 A.M., and that huby was still asloo, when he departed. He made business calls and stopped for lumah at a place called Jacques, believed to be at Carol Street and the Expression. It was there that he Lourned of the shooting of President Kannedy. He said that he did probably what everybedy else did that day, listen to the news and prived over the President's death. He returned to the apartment and wont to bod at approximately 10:30 P.M. He does not recall seeding haby again that day.

At about 3:00 A.M., Saturday, November 23, 1963, Jack came to Senator's room and woke him. Jack told him he had been at his sister Evals place, said that he had bought food for her, and that both had cried over the death of the President. Ruby then phoned a man known to Senator as Larry at the Carousol Club and told him to get out the polaroid camera and meet them on the street in front of the club. In the moantimo, Buby had asked Senator to get up and no some place with him. Ruby and Sonator drove to the Carousel Club where they picked up Larry with the camara and drove to Hall Street and Expression where Ruby took three pictures of a poster bearing the words, "Ingeach Earl Marron." Sanator said that Ruby was quite incensed about this poster and that he could not understand how anyone would have the nerve to put up such a sign and that shoover they were they would have to be commiss or birchers. At the same time Suby was carrying an ad which he had out from a newspaper in which a number of questions were put to President Konwady by a Dernard Messman. Senator said that haby was also very "hot" about this article and casented that Mesman did not spell his name as a Jow, but if he wore a Jow he should be ashand of himself. They went to the Southland Hotel Coffee Shop and had coffee, Buby drinking grapefruit juice. Inile thare, Duby reread the ad and made corrects about it. They left the Coffee Shop and went to the Main Dallas Post Office on Ervay Stroet where Ruby rang the night bell. A postal clork responded and Buby asked him who Dermard Meesman was and who had rented the Post Office Dox. the number of which appeared in the article. The postal clerk told huby that he did not know anything about the matter and the only person who could answer Ruby's questions would be the Postmaster. After this Ruby took Larry back to the Carousel Club and both Senator and Ruby wont to their apartment at approximately 5:00 A.M.

Sonntor said that he avoke about 20.30 A.H. and shortly after voke abby. They fixed breakfast and watched television. Sonnter said that haby was very contional and kept asking what would helpen to the Fresheart's faulty, his wife and his children. He also expressed convexfor the policenan who had been killed by Chanld. Ruby said that both the killing ware in cold blood, but Senator could not recall that at any time he expressed any hatred for Omald. Ruby repeated over and over "Mby did this have to happen?" and expressed pity for the entire kennedy faulty, time and time grain.

Sension left the apartment along about noon on Saturday and spent the afternoon shopping for food and drinking user at various places where he talked with different people regarding the shoutdring. At about 7:30 F.M. he want here and propared dimmer, however, huby did not come in for dinner. Sension left about 6:30 F.M. and vasited with friends mand Bill Doney and Mike Barkley.

Senitor returned to the spartnent about 10:30 P.M. and found that Jack was there and had eaten sense of the food the Senator had cocked earlier. Huby, he said, had been crying and was brooding without saying very much. Fuby went out and Senator want to bed. Sonator awoke on Sunlay morning at approximately 9:00 A.M. Ruby avoke. They had breakfast and Senator said that Jack was "worse in his grief" and described him as being very upset with a fuby was asleep. At about 9:30 A.M. Ruby avoke. They had breakfast and Senator said that Jack was "worse in his grief" and described him as being very upset with a strange look on his face, almost as if he were in shock. During the morning a stripper, little lyrm, telephoned to Ruby from Fort North as he needed money. Jack said he would sand her some by Nestern Union. After that Ruby took his dachshund Stoba and said he was going to drive to the club. Senator did not see Ruby again until after his arrest for shocting Osmald.

Sanator said that it was his opinion that there was no preseditation on the part of Buby in shooting Oswald and that he must have done so on the spur of the memort. Senator said he had heard later that Ruby had opent scio thes at the Carousal Club just sitting around and crying on Saturday. He alled that Ruby was the first club owner to announce that he would close for three days. Senator said there were several things that may not have come to the attention of the authorities which would indicate to him that Ruby had not planned to shoot Oswald. He said the fact that Ruby had the dog Sheba, to which he was very attached, in the car when he woult to the police station alone would indicate that he intended to return soon. Also the fact that he had the cash receipts from the club in the car. Senator said he was comvineed that Ruby had emotionally worked himself up to such a pitch that when he saw Oswald in the basement of the police station he went out of his heal.

Senator said that he did not think that Ruby carried a gun at all times as he had seen Ruby's revolver stored in a blue cannas bag at both the club and at the apartment. He said Ruby always carried the gun when he carried menay from the club to the apartment or to the bank. Senator stated that it was ridiculous to think that Ruby had any connection with subversive organisations or with Oswald.

WILLIAM MILTON BURLEY, III, was interviewed at the Denver Office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, at which time he was advised that he need not make any statement; that any statement made by him could be used against him in a court of law, and that he could consult a lawyer prior to making any statement.

Mr. BURLEY advised that he formerly resided at 7039 Conley Street, Baltimore, Maryland, and that he is presently employed by the Encyclopaedia Britannica Company, 126 West 12th Avenue, Denver, Colorado. He said he is now residing at 3353 West 33rd Avenue in Denver.

BURLEY stated that he graduated from Patterson Park High School, Baltimore, Maryland, in 1954, and thereafter attended Baltimore Junior College from February, 1955, to June, 1955, and also the University of Maryland at Humich, Germany, from January, 1963, to April, 1963.

He said that in August, 1961, he was drafted into the United States Army and assigned to Fort Jackson, South Carolina, for basic training. He said that he later took military police training at Fort Gordon, Georgia, and after completing this training, was stationed with the United States Army at Mamich, Germany, from January, 1962, to July, 1963.

BURLEY stated that while assigned at Munich, Germany, he became acquainted with BERNARD WEISSMAN and LARRY SCHNIDT and during many discussions of political activities, determined that they all shared the same views regarding their approach to American polities. He explained that by this he meant that all favored a conservative type of government and were opposed to the liberals in the United States Government.

He said that thereafter he attended many discussions of political activities with WEISSMAN and SCHMIDT and also other service men who were assigned at Munich. During one of these discussions, toward the end of their time at Munich, someone proposed
