Interview of Manager and Other Personnel at Motel

GUILLERMO GARCIA LUMA advised on March 3, 1984, that he is the owner and manager of the Motel del Comercio, which is located approximately five blocks north of the main eastwest thoroughfare of Mexico City, Pasco de la Reforma, and two blocks east of the principal north-south artery, Avenida Insurgentes. He explained that his hotel caters to commercial travelers, most of whom are Mexican citizens; that it has a total of thirty rooms, most of which are equipped with a private bath; that for a single room the minimum rate, without bath, is 13.00 peecs (\$1.04 U.S.) and the maximum, with bath,

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is 20,000 perco (\$1.00 U.C.). We needed that the hotel is in the heart of the area of many of the bus terminals in Moxico City and also is only a few blocks from the passenger railroad station.

concerning the stay of LER HANNEY CSHALD at the Hotel del Comercio. He received COUNTED and caused him to sign the hotel registration book, which is utilized in place of registration cards. He believed CSWALD's arrival had occurred between 10:00 and 11:00 a.m. The guest makes the initial arrivy in the registration book with data which includes his mane, place of origin, occupation, and nationality; thereafter, so long as the guest remains at the hotel, his name and identifying data are transferred to the registration book page for the current date, after he has made payment in advance for his room for the ensuing night. Inamuch as payment is made in advance, no effort is made to obtain an exact home address for the registrant.

The hotel has four floors, and GSWALD was assigned room No. 18 (with bath) on the third floor at a daily rate of 15,00 peacs (61,28 U.S.) The rooms on the latter floor are numbered from 18 through 23. The hotel registration book reflects that OSWALD paid for his room on October 1, 1953, which, according to GARCIA LUMA, indicates he was catified to and probably sizet at the hotel the night of Catober 1-2, 1963, and departed therefrom during the day of October 2, 1963, GARCIA LUMA stated be could not recall the direcumstances of GGWALD's departure nor the hour thereof, but merely was judging normal procedure on the basis of information in his record,

English and received the impression that OSUALD neither spoke nor understood any Spanish. He had not observed OSUALD in the hotel during the day nor had he ever seen him tocompanied by any individual or individuals. He received that OSUALD had been enrying a medium-size, brown handbag, which he believed had a nipper and was either of Kauganyde or canvas material. He did not remember that OSUALD had ever worn a cost and believed he usually appeared in a short-sleeved whirt of a knit variety.

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Inquiry was made of GARCIA LUNA as to other personnel at the hotel who might recall OSUALD on the basis of having any reason to notice or contact him, and he stated that those persons would be his assistant, NEDLSTIAN PEREZ, and the haid who cleans therocas on the upper two floors, MATILDE GARNICA.

GARCIA LUNA stated that he was acquainted with a few of the guests who were at the hotel during the same period as OSVALD but did not have home addresses for any of them. He mentioned that several of the guests of that period are commercial travelors and return to the hotel from time to time.

MATILDE GARNICA, maid at the Motel del Comercio, advised on March 3, 1964, that she recognized the photographs of OSNIALD as being of the young American who had occupied room No. 18 for almost a week during the latter part of last year. She explained that she handles the daily housekeeping duties for the third and fourth floors of the hotel, comprising rooms numbered 18 through 30, and ordinarily arrives at work between 9:00 a.m. and 10:00 a.m., leaving at 9:00 p.m., upon completion of her working day.

Mrs. GARNICA related that she clearly recalls OSWALD, as few Americans stay at the hotel, and was somewhat intrigued by his presence there. He had very few personal effects, which he carried in what she described as a "small, brown, zippered handbag," which was either of canvas or initation leather material. She did not believe she had seen OSWALD in the hotel on more than two occasions, the day of his arrival and the following Saturday as he was still in his room when she checked to determine which rooms were available for cleaning. She remembered that when she saw him in the room on the Saturday morning in question, he said "good morning" to her in English, and a short time later left the hotel.

She never saw him with any other person and had no conversation with him, having received the impression that he neither spoke nor understood Spanish.

. SEBASTIAN PEREZ HERNANDEZ, desk clork and assistant to the owner of the Hotel Gol Comorcio, advised on March 10, 1964, that he had not conversed with OSVALD but remembered him clearly inasmuch as very few Americans have stayed at

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the hotel. To the best of his recollection, OSMAED left the hotel each morning and did not return until eventng, possibly after PEREZ MENNAMBEZ had completed his working day and left the hotel. He stated OSWAED was alone whenever he noticed him at the hotel and usually were a built, short-sleaved sport shirt and no coat or jacket.

PERZZ HERNARDEZ advised that since OSWALD said his rent in advance for the might of October 1, 1933, there would have been little reason for confact with him on the procumed date of his departure, October 2, 1933, and he was unable to remember any details in this connection.

On April 10, 1994, PEDRO ROBRIGUEZ LEDSSEA advised that he resides at Santa Clara, Jante of Mexico, and for many years has been the night watchman at the Notel Cel Comercio, his working hours being from SiGO p.n. to 9:00 a.m. He explained, however, that he often is able to leave the hotel by 8:00 a.m. or earlier if the owner and manager, GUILLERING GARCIA LUNA, has arrived to relieve thim and handle reception duties. With respect to LEE MEANING OSWALD's stay at the hotel, he furnished the following information.

He clearly recalls the young American when he later identified in his mind as OSWALD and remembers that on the 'date of the latter's departure from the hotel and on the basis of sign language and the word "text," which he inforpreted to indicate that OSWALD wanted a taxicab, RODATSUZZ walked around the corner from the Hotel del Comercio to Crozco y Borra and Bornal Diaz Streeds where he obtained a taxicab which had just left a passenger at the "Estrella Blanca" (White Star) bus terminal. He stated definitely that he did not know the taxi driver and had not known or discussed with the driver or OSWALD the laster's intended destination. He said OSWALD carried his own luggage commstairs and waited in front of the hotel with the luggage until RODATGUZZ returned with the taxicab.

.He believed GSVALD loft the hotel between \$130 and 7:00 a.m., since it was getting light when he went in search of the taxicab. He could not be more procise concerning the time. He believed that GSVALD gave him a small tip of one or two pesos (\$.08 or \$,18 U.S.) for his assistance in calling

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a taxi. RODRIGUEZ commented that while he had little difficulty obtaining a tami at the early hour, it becomes very difficult to secure taxi transportation between 7:30 and 8:30 a.m. because of the heavy traffic at that time.

RODRIGUEZ related that to the best of his recollection OSWALD always arrived at the hotel late at night, "midnight or thereafter," but he never noticed any indication that OSWALD had been drinking. He never observed OSWALD in the company of any person and did not recall his ever using the only telephone at the hotel, which is located at the reception desk.

Unemployment Claims

Mr. MILLER made available a claim record card which had been forwarded from the New Orleans office of the Louisiana Employment Commission. This reflects that an initial claim for unemployment compensation was made on April 29, 1963 by L. B. OSWALD, 757 France Street, New Orleans, Louisiana, Social Security Number 433-54-3937.

The original address is typed in but penciled notations indicate changes as follows:

French Street instead of France Street; P. O. Box 30061, no city listed; 2515 West 5th, Irving, Texas. The dates of these changes are not shown.

Mr. MILLER advised that this claim card indicates that L. H. OSWALD filed a claim for unemployment compensation at New Orleans based upon employment in Texas and that in addition to April 29, 1963, LEE OSWALD, according to the notations on the card, appeared at the New Orleans office of the Louisiana Employment Commission on the following dates:

May 7, 1963	August 20, 1963

During this period no earnings were shown for OSWALD except on July 22, 1963 he reported \$58.00.

Mr. MILLER advised this card further reflects that LEE OSWALD appeared at the Dallas office of TEC on October 3, 1963 and October 10, 1963 and noted that on October 10, 1963 OSWALD signed his name on this card when he appeared. He advised that on the decrease of OSWALD appeared at the TEC office at 2210 Main Street, Dallas,

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
