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thrown his passport on the table and told the officials that he considered himself no longer an American.

MARINA said OSMALD was the type of person who thought that there were green pastures in other countries. She said he had been disappointed in the Soviet Union. MARINA advised that he would like to have combined the job opportunities in the Soviet Union with the freedom of press and other freedoms enjoyed in the United States.

MARINA said in Russia CSWALD had enjoyed meeting people, but frequently he would grow tired of people after he knew them for a while. PAVEL GOLOVACHEV, however, was his best friend. CSWALD and PAVEL enjoyed talking to each other. PAVEL was very elever; he was a good story teller. PAVEL was an expert in electronies and read many periodicals and books on the subject. Although neither CSWALD nor MARINA were interested in electronies, they would listen to PAVEL talk about electronies. OSWALD and PAVEL also discussed politics. PAVEL was very frank and direct in his approach to things and in his conversation. He was candid in his views. MARINA thinks he was honest in his opinions. PAVEL and CSWALD played chess a good bit.

ERIC TITOVIETS, a medical student in Minsk, presented a better appearance than did PAYEL and was more handsome than PAYEL. MARINA stated she was more attracted to ERIC at first than to PAYEL, but when she became better acquainted with each of them, she found that PAYEL being more direct and more honest in his opinions was the more attractive of the two. She found ERIC to be afraid to openly discuss political questions.

In his letter of September 9, 1963 to the OSWALDs, ERIC mentioned the "Z's", MARINA said this was a reference to the ZIEOER family who lived in Minsk and wore friends of the OSWALDs.
