Then there followed the usual, "enemy of the people"meeting, in which in her absonce, she was condomed and her friends at work warned against speaking with her. However, these tactics are quite useless, and my wife stood up well, without getting into trouble.

We are continuing the process and will keep you informed as to the everall picture.

Dear Sire;

All am hereby requesting the Offices of the American Embassy and the Ambassador of the United States, Mr. Thompson, to act upon my case in regards to my application to the Soviet suthorities for an exit visa.

This application was made on July 20, 1961, and althrough three months have already elaphed I have not rectived this vice. There was no difficulty with the application itself or with the supporting documents including my valid American passport No. 17332h2, which was returned to my on July 8, 1961, at the American Embassy in Moscow, where it had been kept for safe-keeping.

I have made repeated inquiries to the proper offices in Minsk but I have, as yot, to receive a satisfactory answer.

I belive there is justification for an efficial inquiry, directed to the department of "Internal Affairs, Prespect Stalin 15, Minck," and the effices of the "address and passport effice," Ulitsa Moskeva, Colonel Petrakef director."

Also, I bolive it is doubley important for an efficial inquiry, since there have been systematic and econorted attempts to intimidate my wife into withdrawing her application for on visa. I have notified the Embanay in regard to these incidents by the local autherities in regard to my wife, these incidents had resulted in my wife being hesyntalized for a five day

period, on September 22, 1961, for nervous exhaustion.

On July 11, 1961 I executed a potition to classify status of alien for issuance of immigration visa, on behalf of my wife, I assume there has been no difficulty with it.

I think if is within the lawful right, and in the interest of, the United States government, and the American Embassy, Mescow, to look into this case on my behalf.
