Mr. Bavila was shown the "Wanted for Treason" leaflet and he said that in his opinion, it. and Mrs. Clifford Mrecor or it. Bill Encan would not have princed this type of literature. Es also said that while he was employed there he does not recall Lettercraft printing any kind of political leaflets or material. Its said that Robert Klause van interested in a "fast buch" and he would not put it past Robert Klause to have printed the leaflet. He said during his employment, he did not see any motorial, scrap, etc., or hear any conversation

that would indicate the leaflet was printed at Lettercraft.

Mr. Davila could not name any type setting company that set type for lettereraft while he was working there as his job was printing.

Mr. Davila was asked if he knew of any friends of Robert Klause that were also in the printing business and he said that he knew of no real close friends, however, there was a man from Fort Worth whose name was Delly or scrething similar to that.

During my interview with km. Mank of Monk Brothers, km. Monk mentioned a Delbert D. Delly, who approached km. Monk about doing some work on credit and said that he was a friend of the people at Lettercraft. Km. Delly produced a card showing a Fort Worth address and also showing the address of Lettercraft at 2615 Oak laws, Dellas.

Mr. Davila was saked if the person's mane could be Delbert Delly and he said that that sounded like the mane. Mr. Davila also said it was his understanding the man was from Fort Worth, Texas.

On 5-12-64 SA Worford and I interviewed Homer Dwight Hatcher at his hore, 562 Ann Arbor, Dallans, Mr. Hatcher eads that he had worked for Lettereraft approximately two works and at the time he worked there he and Robert Klause were the only printers. To the best of Mr. Hatcher's memory, this was in Explanation or Cetober of 1963. At the time Mr. Hatcher worked there, he said they had one or two small presses and that Lettercraft was a small kind of fly by night printing company. Mr. and Mrs. Mercer wanted littcher to take over the printing angle of the business and free Bob Klause to sell and do the comera work. Mr. Eatcher said that he was not happy with the small business and quit after about 2 weeks. Mr. Hatcher said that t the time he worked for Lettercraft, they did not have any kind of type-setting davice or letter press proofing press. The

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"Wanted for Treason" leaflet was shown to Mr. Mitcher and he replied that while he worked at Lottercraft, on one or two occasions he had run some seratch pads using the identical paper. The paper is 9" x 12" and 4 scratch pads are printed per page and later cut end gland into scratch pads. Mr. Blatcher and that he run 6,000 or 8,000 cheens, Mr. Blatcher and that he had not been employed at Lottercraft long enough to really get to know Mr. and Mrs. Koreer and Robert Klause, and could not render any opinion. Mr. Blatcher said that he was also very busy printing during the time that he worked there and that he did not know anything about any of the type setting companies that Lottercraft used, or any of the friends of Robert Klause or Mr. and Mrs. Moreer. Batcher could furnish no additional information of value in this investigation.

SYNOPSIS

Dean Androws, Jr., Attorney, New Orleans, advised that Oswala hill visited his office on approximately three occasions in June-July, 1963, relative to his citizenship status, his wife's status and his undesirable disolarge from the Narine Corps. On 11/23/63 Attorney Andrews was contacted by telephone by a Clay Bertrand, who inquiried if he would be interested in defending Oswald. Inquiries made at Tulane University re Clay Bertrand and A. J. Hidell.

DETAILS OF INVESTIGATION

Reference is made to previous reports submitted in this case.

On 11/25/63 Attorney Dean A. Andrews, Jr., who is well known to this office, contacted SAIC Rice by telephone from the Hotel Dieu Hospital in New Orleans, where he was confined as a patient.

He advised that in June and July, 1963, dates unrecalled, Lee H. Oswald had visited his office on three occasions and expressed concern about (1) his citizonship status; (2) his wife's status; and (3) his undesirable discharge from the Marine Corps which he claimed had made it impossible to obtain suitable employment.

In Andrews said that Oswald was accompanied 1 a total of approximately five persons during the three visits. He said that he knew two of the subjects by sight, and that on two occasions he was accompanied by a young man of Merican extraction (not Ouban), whom he did not know. He said he believed that all of Oswald's companions were homesxuals who possibly frequent the Gaslight Bar in the French Quarter, where such individuals congregate. He said Oswald was supposed to furnish him \$20.00 and also his Marine Corps serial number in order to obtain copies of pertinent records from the
