I found that out later. And that was my first and last contact with Lee Oswald."

Lee's limit teacher at Ridglea West Elementary School was Mrs. Clyde Livingston, a warm, lively woman who took a special interest in Lee and probably knew him as well as anyone outside his family. 'Lee left an empty home in the morning, went home to an empty home for lunch, and returned to an empty home of night.' Mrs. Livingston said. I once asked him in his mother left a lunch for him.
