TO MURDER GUN
BY PHOTOGRAPHFound in Russian Born
Wife's Home

DALLAS (AP)—Dallas Police Chief Jesse Curry said today night photographs found in the home of Lee Harvey Oswald's Russian-born wife link him with the rifle used in the assassination of President Kennedy.

Curry said the pictures found in the home in suburban Irving, Tex., will be used as evidence in Oswald's murder trial.

He has been charged with murdering the President, killing a Dallas policeman and now with attempting to kill Texas Gov. John Connally.

The last charge, event with latest to murder Connally, was filed Saturday afternoon, the chief said.

"We had this case to go to court this morning and it is even stronger tonight," Curry said.

FBI HAS LETTER

"We are going to work on this until we have a perfect case," Brooklyn Capt. Will Fritz said.

Curry said the FBI has a letter in Oswald's handwriting, linking the rifle from a "red" order house in Chicago. Oswald used an alias and a Dallas post office box number in the letter, he said.

The rifle cost \$120, Curry said.

"This man killed the President," Fritz said.

In all probability, Curry added, Oswald will not be questioned much more Saturday night. He is to be transferred to the Dallas County jail — he's now at the city jail — at 10 a.m. Sunday.

NO STATEMENT SEEN

Oswald has repeatedly denied any connection with Kennedy's death.

"We have been in this business a long time," Curry said. "After you've talked to a man you can usually tell whether or not he will sign a statement."

RECALL OSWALDPrincipal, Students Can't
Remember Him

Miss Amy H. Horvick, retired principal at Warren Easton High School, thought for a moment.

"I can't recall the name, Lee Oswald," she said slowly. "And, usually, I do have a pretty good memory of my students."

"You just can't think that someone could have done something like assassinating President Kennedy. He must have been ill-adjusted, especially the way he fitted from parents to relatives."

This was a typical comment on Lee Harvey Oswald, the self-confessed Marxist who is charged in Dallas, Tex., with gunning down President Kennedy and wounding Texas Gov. John Connally.

"File," was an apt description of Oswald. . . . at least, school-wise.

He transferred into Beauregard Junior High School in 1961 from Public School 41 in New York, N. Y. at Beauregard, according to Orleans Parish school board records, he was a below average student.

Oswald entered Warren Easton, Sept. 8, 1962. He filled out a questionnaire. Under favorite subjects, he listed civics, mathematics and science. His vocational choices were biology and mechanical drawing.

LITTLE FRIENDS 'NONE'

Under favorite pastimes, Oswald listed reading and outdoor sports, such as football.

Asked to name any close personal friends at Easton, he listed "none."

Despite his "below average" student status at Beauregard, Oswald scored handsomely on cooperative achievement tests administered at Easton. He scored 88 percentile in reading, an association which he apparently enjoyed, and 85 in vocabulary. In last morning, 84 percentile is considered average.

According to Easton records, his mother wrote a letter dated Oct. 1, 1963, saying that the family was leaving for New Orleans, La. However, six months later, Easton officials received a letter requesting his transcripts from a Ft. Worth, Tex., high school.

Oswald has shown in Houston and "apparently is proud of it," he said. The second man questioned revealed in the same place as Oswald, a person from which Oswald is a "very close friend."
